


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From the Head of School's desk . . .



DECEMBER



In the season finale on Dec. 6, the host Falcons' Green and Gold academic teams secured the No. 1 and No. 2 spots, outscoring all public school teams for the 2002 county championship. Seniors Elaina Bayard

and Jackson Nealis, as top individual scorers over the course of the season, qualified to represent Manatee County as members of the six-student team that will travel to state competition in the 2023 Commissioner's Academic Challenge.

■ The Honors Marine Science 3 class welcomed Dr. Terrie Bert to campus on Dec. 1. Dr. Bert is an accomplished marine scientist who recently retired following a more than 30-year career with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Research Institute. She spent much of her career collecting data on stone crabs, publishing more than 150 scientific papers, running the Crustacean Research Program and the Molecular Genetics Lab.

The SSES lacrosse programs organized a drive that resulted in a massive amount of donated goods. "Superhero Day" was also held on campus, where students, faculty, and staff donned their best superhero gear in exchange for a monetary donation. More than \$7,500 was collected for relief efforts.

SEPTEMBER

- Middle School teacher Tony Haakman was been named the state's Latin Teacher of the Year by the Classical Association of Florida. He's the third SSES Latin teacher to win this award since the association began handing it out in 1981. Linda Mishkin won in 1997 and Geoff Revard in 2006.
- Beating a downpour by just minutes – Saint Stephen's first graders participated in the annual

- Upper School history students received a virtual visit on Aug. 24 from 2006 SSES alumma and U.S. Park Ranger Jill Leverett. Leverett is assigned to Castillo de San Marcos in Saint Augustine, the oldest masonry fort in the U.S., dating back to 1672. Her history lesson gave the students an overview of the early French and Spanish conflict that eventually led to the fort's construction and how it evolved
- One of the surprises we all returned to campus to enjoy is the beautiful, newly outfitted and designed IT Inspiration Center in the Upper School. It's complete with a beautiful undersea mural created by seniors Amelia Sabo and Dagny Van Aken.



A WORLD OF POSSIBILITIES

A stop at airport customs provided the first challenge, and with it came the realization that they had entered a new country . . . and a new world.

"I could look in their eyes and see that it was a little intimidating," Maggie Gustavus said. "There is a bit of immediate culture shock when you're surrounded by security people examining your passport and asking you questions."

For the first time in more than three years, Saint Stephen's students went abroad this fall when Gustavus and 10 of her AP Spanish students traveled to Spain on an immersive, 10-day adventure that transformed quickly from intimidating to lifechanging. The group made stops in Seville, Cordoba, Madrid, and Barcarrota, home of one of SSES's eight sister schools around the world. They stayed at the homes of local families, took in the sights and sampled Spanish cuisine, tried a flamenco dance lesson, an art class, learned to prepare paella and gazpacho, visited an olive farm and olive oil processing agri-business, and much more.



It was a visit that served as a sort of re-launch point for Saint Stephen's signature global program. Although collaborative activities with schools around the world continued via videoconference throughout the restrictions placed on all of us by the Covid-19 pandemic, no face-to-face interactions had taken place since 2019. The visit to Spain signaled a welcome return of a large part of what makes the SSES program so special.

"I knew this was going to be meaningful to these students. I've taught most of them for four years and I know them pretty well, but I think I was surprised by how deeply they felt it," Gustavus said. "Some had never been out of the country or to a big city like Madrid and it really expanded their horizons.

"I hope the experience brings them more of a passion for the language and a desire to study abroad for a semester when they get to college. I know that some may never live in a Spanishspeaking country or speak much Spanish again after they leave me, but an opportunity like this teaches them that it's okay to try new things. Risk-taking isn't something to be avoided, but to be embraced."

By the halfway point of the trip, the students had fully found their footing and their confidence with the language, thanks to three days in Barcarrota and an opportunity to interact with young people their own age. Instead of a tour guide, waiter, or store clerk, discussions with their peers in Spain made them realize, "We got this! We can do this," according the Gustavus.

The same can be said for the return of global interactions at Saint Stephen's in their entirety.

Beginning in early October, Adventina Emmanuel spent a month on campus observing classrooms and other operations to help grow programs for her school in Tanzania and create an even

stronger bond between her students and those at SSES. Tina hails from Iringa International School, the first of Saint Stephen's sister schools, and serves as the WAHI (We Are the Hope of Iringa) Project Coordinator with Global Outreach Tanzania. The voluntary after-school program is designed to motivate primary and secondary students to become strong and confident leaders as it addresses challenges faced in Tanzania education, including a lack of science, technology, and reading focus.

"Most Tanzanian youth, especially the ones in rural areas, have potential but they lack the opportunity to show their potential," Emmanuel said. "Therefore, it's our responsibility to create a space for them to showcase their abilities."

Students from another SSES sister school – Esbjerg International School in Esberg, Denmark – arrived on



campus on Oct. 26 and experienced a full schedule of events before departing on Nov. 2. The 10 students and their headmaster interacted with classes in every division, participated in our Halloween celebrations, a kayak trip, and much more while being hosted by SSES families during their stay.



An earlier visit from Maria Benavides Sosa of Barcarrota helped set the stage for our class trip. Maria was in Bradenton as part of the Manatee Chamber of Commerce sister city exchange program. She is studying elementary education in college and spent a day at Saint Stephen's visiting classes and prepping our AP Spanish students for their October visit. She also hosted one of our students at her home during their visit.

Following Thanksgiving break, Anna García Guxens from Jesuïtes de Sarrià - Sant Ignasi in Spain was on campus for a day. SSES Spanish teacher Laura Vergés-Oller had made two previous visits to the PK-12 independent school in Barcelona, but this was Anna's first to Saint Stephen's. Our Upper School Spanish students were already participating in a collaborative project with students from Jesuïtes de Sarrià - Sant Ignasi, so it was a unique opportunity to meet one of the school's current faculty members.

The spring will bring a busy schedule of additional international interactions. Highlights include a return exchange trip to Denmark in March for 12 students and three teachers, a group of faculty members will attend the Global Education Benchmarking Group Annual Conference in Washington, D.C. in April, as well as Saint Stephen's welcoming educators from all over the world from the Global Alliance of Leading Edge Sustainable Schools for a conference planning meeting during February break.

In chatting with alumnus Benjamin Petlock '90 from his home in Vietnam, where he lives with his wife, Fae, and works as a Senior Agricultural Attaché at the U.S. Consulate in Ho Chi Minh City, the conversation about his Saint Stephen's days and what they mean to him belie the fact that he graduated 32 years ago.

His memories come streaming back as though events at school happened yesterday, as do the names of the teachers who impacted his life and those of fellow Falcons and their families who've come to define Ben's Saint Stephen's experience. That collection of people, many of whom Ben keeps in contact with to this day, along with a sense of belonging to a lifelong community, is what he feels distinguishes Saint Stephen's from other institutions. In particular, he fondly recalls classmates' parents whom he says, "looked after everyone." He credits many of his former teachers with providing a global education that prepared

him well for college and life beyond, including his work abroad.

While Ben couldn't know what his future held at the time, in retrospect those faculty members nurtured an interest in international affairs that has culminated with Ben living in multiple countries and doing important work on behalf of the United States. Before moving to Ho Chi Minh City, he served at the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo, Japan, and Hanoi, Vietnam.

Ben works at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agricultural Service, which links U.S. agriculture to the world to enhance export opportunities and global food

security. As a Foreign Service Officer, Ben's favorite thing about his job is that no day is the same and that he works on a wide variety of issues. A typical workday could include being in critical government-to-government negotiations that can affect billions of dollars of bilateral agricultural trade. Other times, he travels into the Vietnam countryside to meet with local farmers and conducts research that is essential to trade reports his office issues for world markets. Ben also develops marketing campaigns and outreach events to help promote U.S. agricultural products and food culture to Vietnam's growing number of consumers.

Ben came to SSES in the sixth grade and his brother, Sam Petlock, joined him at Saint Stephen's in kindergarten and is a Forever Falcon who graduated with the class of 2000. As a student, Ben's love of literature was stoked by Mrs. Teahan's reading of "The Hobbit" to enthralled listeners at lunchtime. Ben also enjoyed Mrs. Rees's English and literature classes, which fostered his love

of reading. Ben recalls fun Middle School Latin classes with Ms. Mishkin and doing his best to master the French language with Mrs. Boguszewski in Upper School. Mrs. Margaret Sanford taught Ben's religion classes, which he found thought-provoking and served as a catalyst for lively discussions with her introduction to C.S. Lewis books. He recalls Mr. Whelan's "May Program" session on public speaking fondly, but when pushed for a favorite teacher from his SSES days, Ms. Pat Murphy shines brightly. Ben loved her U.S. history classes and her special constitutional law class piqued his interest in government and public service.

Ben went on to George Washington University in Washington, D.C. and, after graduation, he remained in D.C. and moved in with fellow Falcon alumni and best friends Jason Kaplan '91, Zack Kaplan '90, Daniel Miller '89, Will Pearce '89, and Pedro Ramos '91. The household helped foster a sense of community, especially

> since everyone had just graduated from college, and Ben says their influence on him was profound. He valued their opinions and he still recalls and lives by a sentiment expressed by Daniel Miller, who passed away in 2017 and remains beloved by alumni in many Saint Stephen's classes. Daniel also treasured his SSES years, the education he received, and the abundant lifelong friendships he made. He encouraged Ben and all of his friends to always remember Saint Stephen's days and to give back to a place that was so important in all of their lives. Ben continues to take Daniel's advice to heart and is a loyal and deeply appreciated supporter of the school.



When asked if he has any advice for today's students, Ben suggests they strive to be honest, vulnerable, and open to new ideas, as well as recognize that there is always room to grow throughout life. He believes we change as people from day to day and encourages students to challenge themselves in all facets of life continually.

Ben truly values his Saint Stephen's education, and no matter where in the world his job takes him in the coming years, he'll always be grateful for his teachers and mentors, friends from a variety of classes ("a cool hallmark of an SSES education friendships among students of all ages"), the caring parents of students who nurtured all who came through their doors, and above all, the experiences he believes shaped the man he has become in a myriad of significant ways.



A TALE OF TWO SEASONS

The football Falcons proved it's not how you start, it's how you finish during a Jekyll-and-Hyde 2022 season that culminated in the Sunshine State Athletic Conference 5A Championship. Saint Stephen's dominated Ocoee Legacy Charter, 47-7, in Lakeland on Nov. 12 to complete one of the most remarkable turnarounds in program history.

Following a 1-5 start, the Falcons ripped off five consecutive victories to win their third SSAC crown in six years. The transformation began during a week-seven triumph over Fort Myers Gateway Charter. That's when a sluggish SSES offense was energized by a change in scheme that put running back Evan Brown in the wildcat formation alongside senior quarterback Luke Donley. After averaging just 16.5 points per game over the first six, the Falcons scored more than 32 points per game during their run to the title.

"We lost some close games early because we weren't really playing as a team. But we kept at it and the guys started to gel together and understand that it was little things here and there that were costing us football games," Head Coach A.J. Brown said. "The kids took ownership of it and that really turned our season around. And when we put Evan in the wildcat, it got our offense going because we were able to start doing different things to take advantage of all the weapons we had."

Donley saved one of his best performances for last, completing eight of 10 passes for 133 yards and four touchdowns in the championship game. Fellow senior Justin Millican, playing his first season of football, finished the year with 31 receptions for 548 yards and 11 touchdowns – including three in the title game. Evan Brown, the catalyst for the Falcons' late-season offensive surge, finished his junior campaign with more than 1,300 rushing yards and 13 touchdowns. Junior linebacker Ivan Tulupov paced

the Falcons with 61 tackles and sophomore defensive end Austin Varga recorded a team-best 10 sacks.

The SSAC title was the Falcons' first since 2017. The 2016 and 2017 Saint Stephen's teams earned back-to-back all-division championships before the league broke its football post-season play into upper and lower classifications. The Falcons have now advanced to the SSAC finals five times in the past eight seasons.

BOYS GOLF FALLS SHORT OF REPEAT

After dominating the regular season, the prestigious Donald Ross Invitational, and the district and regional tournaments, the Falcons struggled during their state tournament round on Nov. 12, and finished in a three-way tie for eighth place in Class 1A. SSES was looking to defend its 2021 state championship, but was derailed by a tough day on the course and Hurricane Nicole, which altered the typical two-day event to a one-round, winner-take-all format. Senior Jet Chen shot 77 to pace the Falcons and finished tied for 25th place. It was a bittersweet close to a season in which the Falcons – led by brothers Ben and Alex Long – established themselves as the class of the area's high school teams.

SWIMMERS ADVANCE TO STATE

Five Falcons advanced all the way to the state championship meet at the Sailfish Aquatics Center in Stuart on Nov. 18, and although none brought home medals, the experience should mean a bright future for SSES swimming. Four of the five qualifiers are ninth graders or younger. Eighth grader Blair Wootson already established a new school record in the 200-yard IM this season and placed 21st in the Class 1A meet. The 200-yard free relay team of senior Elyse Skoumal, eighth grader Camryn Sanders, freshman Danielle Weathers, and seventh grader Piper Pullen swam to a 19th-place finish at Stuart.

ICONIC.

That's what Chase and Sydney Brown have become in the history of the Saint Stephen's football program for their contributions during back-to-back state championship seasons with the Falcons in 2016 and 2017. And for those who knew them during their time here, SSES was clearly going to be a stepping stone to something bigger.



The University of Illinois has offered a large stage for the 2018 grads and the lights shine guite a bit brighter in the Big Ten, one of college football's "power conferences," but the twin brothers continue to rise to every challenge. The Browns have led Illinois to one of its finest seasons in decades, and they'll return to the Sunshine State for the Reliaquest Bowl when UI takes on Mississippi State at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa on Jan. 2. It will be the close of another chapter in their story.

Chase led the nation in rushing for much of the 2022 season and finished second with 1,643 yards, helping him become the No. 2 rusher all-time at Illinois. He was one of three finalists for the Doak Walker Award, given annually to college football's top running

back. Sydney capped his UI career by being named a first team all-Big Ten defensive back. He played in 51 games for the Illini, snagged 10 interceptions (tied for the national lead with six as a senior), and made 319 career tackles.

Both brothers have accepted invitations to participate in the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala., on Feb. 4. The game, and the practices leading up to it, are an opportunity to showcase their talents to NFL scouts as the Browns audition for their next stop – a career in professional football. They recently took time to discuss their journey so far . . .

Q: You both went from lightly recruited out of high school to all-conference college players. There must be special satisfaction in that.

Chase: It's definitely sweet, but we went to Saint Stephen's, a small school that's known for its academics, so I understand it. We didn't know what to expect from any of that when we came. We were there to make sure we were ready academically for college and to chase a dream athletically. I'm sure there are schools that wish they'd recruited us now.

Sydney: For sure. We were always confident in our abilities, but it was just part of the journey.

Q: It looked like you'd go your separate ways after graduating from Saint Stephen's. Chase signed at Western Michigan and Sydney at Illinois. Was that a conscious decision to pursue your own paths?

Chase: It wasn't anything we specifically talked about or planned. For me it really was about wanting to be a pilot and going that way for school. Syd was focused on chasing the football part of it as far as it would go. God kind of led us back together and I wouldn't change it.

Sydney: Right, it's just what ended up happening. It wasn't part of a plan, but I do think it was good for our growth, and it was a big step at the time. We'd always had each other to lean on and even when we were apart we were FaceTiming all the time. But being able to be here and graduate together is something really special.

Q: At Illinois, the marketing staff has done its best to make you guys the face of Illinois football. How did you adjust to that "celebrity" status?

Chase: It's a blessing really, and I think it just reflects on the hard work we've put in. I have people recognize me all the time – when I'm in a restaurant, pumping gas, wherever. I think the coolest thing was when they put my jersey on the alma mater statue – which is a pretty big thing here on campus. It is kind of cool. I'd be lying if I didn't admit that.

Sydney: In the moment it's always a little bit of a shock, but like Chase said, it all came with hard work, and with work you get opportunities. It's a little surreal, but this has been a dream of ours since we were 12. There are times in town where you can't walk anywhere without being stopped.

Q: Along the same lines, we've seen features about you on Good Morning America, read stories in Sports Illustrated, the Chicago Tribune, etc. Did you ever imagine those opportunities would present themselves?

Chase: When you're getting recruited, you don't think much about it. You think about making big plays and scoring touchdowns, not those other things. But people definitely have a passion for and love college football, and that's the attention that comes with it when you're successful.

Sydney: You can't force it. It just comes naturally. But it's been awesome. We just take it one experience at a time.

Q: You didn't reach your goal of winning the Big Ten, but you have to feel fortunate that you were able to play in some memorable games and bring some excitement to Illinois football that has been lacking.

Chase: It's something I'll remember for the rest of my life. When I first set foot on campus, it was not a great place. We went through a lot and there were some rough times. But I think we made up for a lot of that this year.

Sydney: In a lot of ways, it was just like when we came to Saint Stephen's. We wanted to help the program win and leave a legacy of toughness and dependability – set a standard. I walked in at Illinois with big time goals and aspirations. My first few years we didn't win, but hopefully we've helped establish a culture of winning here that they'll build on.

Q: Two of your former SSES teammates – Peyton Vining and Dylan Davis – are also at Illinois. What's it like having those familiar faces around?

Chase: Really cool. I just love them to death. They're both extremely talented players, great guys, and it brings back a lot of good memories of Saint Stephen's having them here.

Sydney: It's been special. I could never imagine the four of us being here together. That's unbelievable to me, but it's a testament to how they work. They wouldn't be here if they weren't established players.

Q: When Covid-19 hit, you were stuck at home in Canada and couldn't get back to campus for awhile. What was that time like?

Chase: Well, it was interesting because we were in another country and couldn't get back even though we wanted to put in work with the team. I think it taught us that you have to make the most of every opportunity in front of you, no matter how big or how small. We could have said, "Well, we're in quarantine so we can just take a break," but we made the most of being home, bought a bunch of gym equipment and set ourselves up to be successful.

Sydney: It definitely was a lesson in perseverance and staying focused. You had to stay the course and believe that what you were doing now would pay off later. You learn about yourself and self reflect. A lot of it was through trial and error. We went back to what we know.

Q: Will you be leaving Illinois with your degrees?

Chase: We both are. I have a bachelor's in advertising and I'm halfway to a master's in business management. Syd's degree is in sports marketing.

Q: You have a bowl game and the Senior Bowl in the immediate future, then a chance to possibly play professionally. What goes through your mind when you think about those opportunities?

Chase: At this point, we're still considering what's best for us and whether or not we'll play in the bowl game in Tampa. But the Senior Bowl is a really big opportunity. I know that scouts from every NFL team will at least make an appearance there. So to be evaluated by the NFL alongside a bunch of NFL-caliber talent is a really amazing opportunity.

Sydney: What's funny is when you're going through the process you don't realize it's coming your way. It's amazing how it all fell into place. Right now, my focus is on really making a run at this and putting myself in a position to change my life and life for my family. We're taking it one step at a time, but I think we've been building up to this for some time. We've always practiced at being a "pro" and developing habits, routines, and accountability for ourselves. The more success you have, you find people trying to jump into your circle. It's important to keep it small with the people who have your best interests in mind. Eliminate distractions and focus on the people who love you for who you are and not what you do.

Q: The most obvious question we have to ask is what kind of impact your time at Saint Stephen's had now that you've had a few years to look back?

Chase: I will say this, and I'm not going to talk about athletics at all. The focus on academics and the relationships we built at Saint Stephen's were priceless. My leadership skills, work ethic, my whole mindset started at Saint Stephen's. It was developed there. I'm just grateful for everyone I crossed paths with. If we didn't go to Saint Stephen's we wouldn't be in this position today. That's a fact. We know we have unconditional support from everyone at Saint Stephen's and we love everyone there.

Sydney: We came in with nothing. We always had family support, but it was really like a last chance for us to change our lives. The people at Saint Stephen's – teachers, Coach Creneti, Coach Vining, Coach Brown – really poured into us. The values we learned there we lean on today. It changed our lives. Without the opportunity that came, none of this would have happened. I probably would have been working in a trade right now. We owe the world to Saint Stephen's for everything the amazing people did for us that we were around and introduced to. It was a blessing. We wouldn't be the men we are today without Saint Stephen's.

2021-22 Year in Review

While school opened in August with Saint Stephen's still carefully navigating the lingering challenges of a global pandemic, the headline that would dominate was an upcoming transition in leadership. In September 2021, Head of School Dr. Jan Pullen announced that she would be retiring following the 2022-23 school year, setting in motion a national search for her successor.

Three finalists were brought to campus for interviews in early spring and Peter Kraft was eventually chosen by the Board of Trustees and announced in April 2022. With more than 25 years experience as a teacher and administrator, Kraft will come to Saint Stephen's from Oregon Episcopal School in Portland, where he has served as Associate Head of School since 2017. He officially begins in his new role on July 1, 2023.

The academic year produced a number of highlights. In the first in-person games since 2020, 36 Upper School and 11 Middle School students joined students from around Tampa Bay in February for the Regional Latin Forum. All 47 students earned at least 10th-place honors and SSES finished second overall. That same month, Saint Stephen's placed second overall at the Spoonbill Regional of the National Ocean Science Bowl at the USF College of Marine Science in St. Petersburg. It was the highest-ever finish in the competition by a Saint Stephen's team. Three Saint Stephen's students were part of the six-member Manatee County team that finished second in the state at the annual Commissioner's Academic Challenge, March 31-April 2 in Orlando. Falcons Jackson Nealis, Sophia Berry, and Luke Phommachanh helped Manatee win the preliminary and semi-final rounds to advance to the Division I Finals.




Saint Stephen's celebrated its 47th graduating class in May with a commencement ceremony at Harvest United Methodist Church in Lakewood Ranch. The 58 seniors collected their diplomas and enjoyed an inspirational graduation address from Elizabeth Djinis, an alumnae of the Class of 2012, graduate of Duke University, and a decorated journalist. The Class of 2022 matriculated to 40 different schools in 20 different states and countries. The class featured a National Merit Scholar and multiple honors college acceptances. Seven graduates were recruited student-athletes.

A state championship from the boys' golf team in November 2021 highlighted the year in athletics. It was the third state title in program history and the first since 2004. While no other Falcons team reached quite those heights during the year – boys tennis was state runner-up and girls lacrosse advanced to the state's final eight – SSES collected four district (girls golf, boys and girls tennis, girls soccer) and one regional championship (boys tennis).

Philanthropy of all kinds was an important part of the year. Local businesses helped support our Community Partner Program with more than \$100,000 and provided even more value through in-kind donations. During Annual Giving Week, our community of supporters donated more than \$176,000, and our endowment grew by \$61,850. The push to fund the S.T.E.A.M. Center was front and center all year as we raised \$4.132-million, putting us another step closer to making this dream building a reality.
