

Following an extensive national search, the Board of Trustees has named Peter Kraft the new Head of School at Saint Stephen's. He will officially take on the role July 1, 2023, after a one-year leadership transition period.

With more than 25 years experience as a teacher and administrator, Peter comes to Saint Stephen's from Oregon Episcopal School in Portland, where he has served as Associate Head of School since 2017. After beginning his career in New England, Peter moved to Peddie School in Hightstown, N.J. in 1995 as a history teacher and coach. He left Peddie as Academic Dean in 2011 to become Associate Head of Academic Affairs at Park Tudor School in Indianapolis, Ind. He also served as Interim Head of School at Park Tudor in 2016-17.

A native of Pittsburgh, Penn., Peter earned a bachelor's degree in history from The College of William and Mary, a master's in U.S. history from the University of Virginia, and a master's in private school leadership from Columbia University Teachers College.

He becomes the sixth Head of School at Saint Stephen's and succeeds Dr. Janet Pullen, who has been an administrator at SSES <u>since 1988 and has served as its leader since 2003.</u>

Q: What was it that first attracted you to the position?

A: More than anything, it was Saint Stephen's culture and values. SSES is clearly a school that "walks the talk" – students are truly "known and valued," and it's clear that young people come first. That is incredibly important to me. I also appreciate Saint Stephen's academic rigor combined with its commitment to the arts and athletics. Good schools understand that these areas work together; that they are critical to helping to produce happy, healthy, well-rounded young people. Lastly, I was drawn to Saint Stephen's history of strong, stable leadership. People clearly love the school. And, like Dr. Pullen, whom I find incredibly impressive and inspirational, they stay. That is a huge draw for our family.

Q: What were your impressions of the school community when you spent time on campus during the interview process?

A: What stood out to both Kim (my wife) and me was that Saint Stephen's is a happy school. The students and adults love it here. They are proud of SSES and they care enough to have high standards and high aspirations for themselves and the community. You know, when I visit any school I always spend a few minutes at the beginning of the day walking around and saying hello to people. I watch for certain things: do students smile at you? Do they stop to chat or ask if they can help? Do adults seem rushed, or do they slow down to connect? What I saw at Saint Stephen's was a deeply relational school - one where people come first. That is what great schools are all about: building community and ensuring that connections are created and maintained. I was really excited to see that.

Q: Did you learn anything that surprised you at that time?

A: I think what surprised me the most was how beautiful the school is. Driving by it on Manatee Avenue, you really don't get a full sense of the campus. I was so impressed with the physical spaces: the Marine Science building, the impressive athletic complex, the open and inviting learning spaces. Of course, none of that means anything without adults who are dedicated to students and young people who care about one another. But when you have all of these things, magic happens.

Q: How would you describe SSES at this point in its history?

A: To me, it's like a healthy teenager. It is full of life; it is willing to struggle with important things. But it has a long life ahead of it, and it is still open to possibilities. I am a historian, so I love to find inspiration in the past. (I also chatted with Bernie Yanelli when I was on campus and he told me that I could be part of the Hamilton-Jefferson Society. I can't wait!) So let me draw another analogy. After the Revolutionary War, the U.S. was still a fledgling nation and Alexander Hamilton was charged with selling newly-issued bonds throughout Europe. When skeptical investors asked why they should give money to a newly-independent nation, Hamilton described America as a "Hercules in the cradle." While Saint Stephen's is certainly beyond that stage of its history, there is so much promise ahead. SSES is really important to the greater Bradenton-Sarasota community, too. We have an obligation to help make our region and state an even better place to live. Building on what Dr. Pullen and her team have already done in this regard is a blessing.

Q: How have your experiences prepared you for this opportunity?

A: Being a Head of School is challenging. But I am fortunate to have been a Head before. So I have done many of the critical things that Heads do: work with boards, raise money, develop programs, hire faculty and staff, and serve as a spokesperson for the school. I have also been fortunate to have had great mentors in each of the schools in which I have worked. I'm lucky to have had Heads who cared about my development and who gave me opportunities to lead. I have run a strategic planning process, chaired an accreditation committee, secured seven-figure gifts for important capital campaigns and led schools through daunting times.

I also really enjoy having the public platform to say "thank you" to all of the extraordinary people who make schools like SSES run. Your parents, for example, do so much: they volunteer for lunch duty, they support the teams and clubs, they organize golf outings. It is so wonderful to be able to honor them for jobs well done. So for me, being a Head is a dream job.

Q: What excites you most about the chance to lead this school?

A: I think it is the opportunity to take an already great school and help it achieve even greater heights. I appreciate that Saint Stephen's cherishes its traditions but also embraces innovation. Great schools need to do both. They need to have traditions that make them special and give them a ballast, to use a nautical metaphor. But they also need to push themselves to stay relevant as education changes. Put differently, SSES knows who it is - and it is ambitious enough to know how to evolve without losing its culture and values. That's very compelling to me.

Q: How would you describe yourself and your leadership style?

A: For me, leadership starts with old-fashioned hard work. Part and parcel of that is making sure you get out into the community to see what folks are working on, what is important to them, and what the "pulse" of the school is. I always tease that I go through multiple pairs of shoes a year walking around school and greeting students, families, and employees. Doing this allows you to really understand your school and its people.

Beyond the relational piece, though, I believe that leadership is about getting the information that you and your teams need to make informed decisions. This starts by surfacing assumptions, doing the required research, getting key data, etc. Then, you explore different aspects of the issue – including making sure that the question you are working on is the right one. It's amazing how frequently folks work on something, only to discover that the crux of the matter is something else entirely. This is why I am a huge proponent of design thinking and user-centered decision-making. When one starts with the end-user – which, in schools, is your students – and works backwards from there, you tend to reveal opportunities and challenges that would otherwise have been missed.

The other thing that I take a lot of pride in is that I am both a listener and someone who understands that as a leader you need to make timely and often difficult decisions. People know that I take their ideas seriously, and they recognize that while I may not always agree with those ideas, I will respect them. But they also know that I will get things done. Schools are good at creating committees. These certainly have their place, but you can "committee" things to death. What people need in leaders is to be heard and respected, but also to have someone who helps create a shared vision that makes it clear where the school is headed.

I think school should be rigorous, but also joyful. I love to laugh, hang out with students and colleagues, and make learning fun. We are doing important work educating young people. But it needs to be enjoyable. I felt this sense of joy at SSES. I look forward to being part of that.

Q: You won't officially take on the role until July 2023, so what does the next year look like for you?

A: I still have a lot of important work left to do at Oregon Episcopal School. This work matters to me, and my job is to leave things in better shape than I found them.

In terms of Saint Stephen's, my first goal is to help honor Dr. Pullen and to support her fully, which includes ensuring that the focus remains on her and her leadership of the school. She's given most of her adult life to SSES. It's important to celebrate her remarkable tenure.

I will be visiting SSES multiple times over the next 12 months – at first to listen and to get to know the community and then, little by little, to work with the Board and Dr. Pullen to get up to speed so that I can hit the ground running in July 2023. But I will start by listening and learning from folks who know far more about Saint Stephen's than I do, but who share my commitment to ensuring that it prospers.

Q: How is your family feeling about this new challenge?

A: We are excited. Plus, my parents live about 90 minutes away in Celebration, Fla. Portland has been a good home for us, but we can't wait to be closer to family and to enjoy what makes Florida so special. We look forward to finding a house near school, joining Christ Church, and becoming a part of Saint Stephen's and the larger community!

On Campus

JANUARY

■ Sophia Berry, Patrick Van Eyck, Jackson Nealis, and Theo Frano represented Saint Stephen's in the Central Florida History Bowl and Bee at Largo High School and came home with a third-place finish. Jackson earned the gold medal in the varsity category and Patrick took silver in junior varsity.



An extensive track resurfacing and repainting at the Moore Athletic Complex was completed in time for the track and field team's spring season. The project was completely funded with proceeds from the annual Saint Stephen's Community Partner Program.

FEBRUARY

- The SSES Math Club participated in its second regional competition at Middleton High in Tampa and finished in seventh place out of 19 participating schools. The Geometry Team of Cooper Henry, Cameron Schindler, Dylan Dam, and Hao Li placed fourth overall, and Cooper was ninth as an individual.
- Seven students from our Middle and Upper schools participated in the district level Solo & Ensemble Music Performance Assessment at Braden River High. Each musician prepared a piece from the event's approved list, performed for an adjudicator, and received a rating. All seven earned a rating of at least "good" and five were judged as "superior," including: Bryson Shrimplin - level 6 piano solo (superior), Sanjay Motwani - level 4 clarinet solo (superior), Jackie Rappold - level 4 clarinet solo (superior). Edward Gao - level 4 bass clarinet solo (superior), and Ryland Krause - level 1 snare drum solo (superior).



Teachers Allison Misiewicz, Jessica Angelo, and nine students participated in the Spoonbill Regional of the National Ocean Science Bowl at the University of South Florida's St. Petersburg campus. The team of Dillon Ogle, Devin Mohr, Matthew Talbot, and Braden Mohr finished in second place overall.

- In the first in-person games since 2020, 36 Upper School and 11 Middle School students joined students from around Tampa Bay at Plant High in Tampa for the Regional Latin Forum. All 47 students earned at least 10th-place honors and SSES finished second overall. Leading the way with two first-place finishes each were senior Tyler Kadivar, sophomore Edward Gao, and freshman Dylan Dam. Also collecting first-place finishes were seniors Sophia Berry, Maxine Mandt, Luke Phommachanh, and Michael Thomas, junior Joshua Sket, sophomore Theo Frano, eighth grader Kai Parker, and seventh grader Emily Dowd. SSES also fielded six certamen teams and won first- and fourth-place honors in the Novice division, second place in Level 1, first place in Level 2, and second and fourth place in the Advanced division.
- Falcons Jake Pettingell and Patrick van Eyck swept the top prizes in the 2022 Theatre Odyssey Student Ten-Minute Playwriting Festival at the Asolo's Cook Theater in Sarasota. Jake's play, "The Real World," won first place and a \$1,000 scholarship. Patrick earned the \$500 runner-up award for "The Last Colony." Entries for the contest were invited from students in grades 9-12 in Sarasota and 15 surrounding counties. The annual festival was held for the first time in 2013 and Saint Stephen's students have now won the top prize six times.



SSES math students finished fifth overall and the geometry team ranked second at a regional math competition at King High School in Tampa. The competitions are run by the Florida Association of Mu Alpha Theta, the national high school and two-year college mathematics honor society.

MARCH

SSES hosted its annual Fine Arts Week, including the Middle and Upper School musical production of "Beauty and the Beast," which featured a series of sold-out performances. The Lower and Intermediate school thespians later produced "Alice In Wonderland" to put a



cap on theater performances for the school year.



At a ceremony held by the Association of Independent School Librarians, our Director of Libraries Christina Pommer was honored with AISL's highest award – the Marky Award. It is given annually to honor AISL members who have made a significant contribution to the organization. Christina has served as AISL's president, president-elect, technology coordinator, and conference organizer in more than a decade of service.



Three Saint Stephen's students were part of the six-member Manatee County team that finished second in the state at the annual Commissioner's Academic Challenge in Orlando. Falcons Jackson Nealis, Sophia Berry, and Luke Phommachanh helped Manatee win the preliminary and semi-final rounds to advance to the Division I finals. In the six-team championship round, Manatee ultimately fell short against the eventual winners from Brevard County, 262-233.

APRIL

- Thanks to our generous community, Saint Stephen's raised \$28,950 in the Sarasota County Community Foundation's 24-hour Giving Challenge. With matches from the Patterson Foundation, the school received \$47,100 in total gifts. These donations have an immediate and direct benefit to each student and faculty member, impacting the quality and range of all school programs.
- SSES honored its 2022 Cum Laude Society inductees: Kate Baran, Elaina Bayard, Luke Bisio, Cincy Chen, Sophia Creneti, Noah McCray, Devin Mohr, Jackson Nealis, Vivian Phung, Michael Thomas, Nolan Winterhalter, and Meng Zhao. The Cum Laude Society honors scholastic achievement in secondary schools and is modeled after the collegiate Phi Beta Kappa. Saint Stephen's has one of 382 chapters worldwide.



In May, for the first time since 2019, Saint Stephen's Middle School students had the opportunity to travel during Interim Quest week. The eighth grade experienced an adventure that included whitewater rafting and a visit to Yellowstone National Park. Seventh graders explored the ocean environment at Seacamp in the Florida Keys.



A GROWING LEGACY

The greatest compliment alumni can pay their alma mater is to entrust their precious child or children's education to the school, continuing to hold the place dear and believing whole-heartedly – and from first-hand experience – that the academic and life lessons taught prepare students exceptionally well for college and beyond. The number of legacy families at Saint Stephen's continues to grow and multiply annually, with 2022 heralding our first third-generation student with the enrollment of Everett Juengling '37. Everett's mother is alumna and faculty member Dr. Stephanie Boothby Juengling '06. His grandfather is Carlos Boothby '83, Saint Stephen's beloved former athletic director. In all, 15 families currently have children enrolled where a parent, parents, or grandparent are graduates. Carlos Boothby - Class of 1983 (Grandpa of Everett '37)




I was a struggling, mixed-up kid in public school when my parents heard about and then sent me to Saint Stephen's. That one moment, though I didn't know it at the time, changed my life. In my time at SSES, I became a more confident person, prepared for life. I had so many positive role models in my teachers and coaches. I made many great friends, a lot of whom are still friends today. Naming a favorite memory is impossible. My overall experience, including playing three sports, the

classes, the social life, the school events and knowing that I was at a place where people cared about me, is what I remember. Saint Stephen's made a huge difference in my life and I wouldn't be who I am today without my experience at the school.

I was extremely excited when, in later life, I got to be a part of SSES again as a member of the athletic staff. Not only would I be returning to my alma mater, but my children would have the opportunity to attend and my wife would ultimately teach at the school. My oldest daughter Stephanie started in sixth grade, my middle daughter Jennifer in second grade, and my son Charlie was a Forever Falcon! It was so great to watch them grow and become adults at Saint Stephen's. The school had grown so much from when I graduated with a class of 23, and offered so many opportunities over and above excellent academics. Watching my children play sports, participate in all-school musicals, compete on Academic Teams, play in the band, and the many other things they were involved in was truly special. The love for learning the school instilled in them led them to be the successful people they are today.

Now, 39 years after my graduation, my grandson Everett is a Fledgling Falcon, making him our third-generation Saint Stephen's student. It has been so special to see him in his uniform and observe him on the same campus that meant so much to me when I was in school. It was also special to watch him perform when I attended my first Grandparents' Day this year. I am truly grateful for all that the school has given to me and it's my hope that I've given a lot back, as well.

Erik Grindal - Class of 1987 (Connor '22)



I attended Saint Stephen's from seventh through 12th grade. During that period, I played junior varsity soccer while in middle school and varsity basketball and soccer in high school. During those six years, I never scored a goal in soccer – even in practice – and my highest score in a basketball game was six points. There were many games where I did not make any baskets. I was never a starter in either sport, and spent a lot of time on the bench. At the athletic banquet in my senior

year, my basketball coach got up to bestow the most valuable player award. In his introduction, he said that the player he was giving the MVP award to was not the best shooter, not the best rebounder, and by no measure the best player. He said he was giving the award to the player who was a leader - because he never missed practice, never missed a game, and always gave his all. He gave me the award.

After a moment of shock, the audience gave me a standing ovation as I went up to accept the plaque. After years feeling embarrassed that my parents had come to games only to watch me sit on the bench, they watched me receive the MVP award and saw the whole gym applaud. It felt great!

Years later, when we were touring the school with my son, I saw a big plague on the wall with all the MVP awards. I showed Connor my name. As my athletic prowess has not improved since high school, he was understandably surprised and asked how it was possible that I had won. I told him the coach, Martin Gilbert, recognized that I had worked hard. Since then, Connor has told me that he points out my name on the plague to his fellow students. The award reinforced what my parents, and playing sports, had taught me. Skill and talent are great, but it is persistence and hard work that win in the end. Having my son witness that every day, is a valuable life lesson. If you keep at it, you will win in the end. If you are wondering, I still have a terrible jump shot.

Serving Up Excellence

An argument can be made that Saint Stephen's boys tennis is currently in the midst of the most successful run in the program's storied history - but so far, without the ultimate payoff.

Since the 2019 season, the Falcons are 46-4-1, with their only regular-season loss being a 4-3 defeat at Sarasota Riverview on April 2, 2019. Their other three setbacks have all been in the state championship match to the same foe – Boca Raton St. Andrews. The latest came on April 26, denying the Falcons the title trophy for the third consecutive season (the 2020 campaign was wiped out by the COVID-19 pandemic).

While the top prize remained elusive, it took none of the luster off another dominating season for Saint Stephen's. The Falcons swept eight of their 10 regular-season opponents and cruised through six playoff matches in district, regional, and state tournament play before squaring off with St. Andrews again.

The SSES girls also won a district title – their fourth in five years – and reached the regional final before falling to Community School of Naples. Both teams remain positioned for continued success with the bulk of their top players returning for the 2023 season.

TRACK AND FIELD: An exciting season was capped at the state championship meet in Gainesville with the girls 4x100 relay team of Nikole Cosentino, Brooke Cosentino, Piper Pullen, and Scout **Erby** reaching the podium with an eighth-place finish. Hurdlers **Layla Smith** and **Julian Lazzara** also qualified. The regular season was highlighted by the Falcons' best-ever combined performance at the Manatee County Track Championships. The girls finished second and the boys were third overall in the nine-school meet, outrunning area public schools with enrollments many times our size.

GIRLS LACROSSE: Despite falling just short in the district championship game, the Falcons advanced to regional play and put together a thrilling run all the way to the regional finals. After topping Tampa Berkeley Prep in the regional opener, SSES avenged its district title loss to Out-of-Door Academy with a nail-biting 7-6 semi-final victory to reach the state's Elite Eight. The post-season run ended at Naples High, but the Falcons registered a 14-3 record in Head Coach Tod Creneti's first year at the helm. Midfielder **Sienna Cassella** was named a USA Lacrosse All-American and teammates **Sophia Creneti** and **Bella Rosa** were chosen All-Academic.

GIRLS BASKETBALL: Jamie Springstead and Maddie Boehm were selected to represent Saint Stephen's in the Manatee vs. Sarasota All-Star Basketball Game on April 21 at State College of Florida and Springstead finished as the game's Most Valuable Player. It was a fitting honor for the two college-bound seniors

who have taken SSES girls basketball to new heights during their time on campus, including a state Final Four appearance in 2019 and a 16-7 record and district runner-up finish in their last season together.

SOCCER: The boys and girls won district titles – the first time since 2019 that both teams took home championship hardware in the same season. The girls were the surprise of the district, after a 5-9-3 season in 2021, the Falcons bounced back to post a 14-4-1 record and advance to the regional semi-finals. The boys mirrored their female counterparts, going 13-5, winning a regional quarterfinal against Admiral Farragut before falling in the semis to St. Petersburg Shorecrest. Their season was highlighted by a thrilling 7-6 shootout win over Bradenton Christian in the district championship game.



ALL-AREA HONORS: *Jake Pettingell* and *Alex Long* were honored as the Sarasota Herald-Tribune All-Area high school players of the year in tennis and golf, respectively, at a starstudded event on May 24 at the Van Wezel Performing Arts Center in Sarasota hosted by former baseball all-star Fred McGriff. Pettingell and Long beat out student-athletes from every classification level – public and private – at high schools from throughout Southwest Florida (Charlotte County north to Manatee County) for the recognition.



ALUM UPDATES: Twin brothers **Sydney** and Chase Brown (Class of 2018) - star studentathletes on the football team at the University of Illinois – were chose to throw out the first pitch on May 25 before the White Sox vs. the Boston Red Sox game at Guaranteed Rate Field in Chicago . . . following two outstanding years at Hillsborough Community College in Tampa, **Sarah** Stevens (Class of 2019) signed in February to play Division I volleyball at Xavier University in Ohio

Football stars **Dylan Davis '20** (Furman to Illinois), **Cam** Vining '20 (West Point to UCF), and Fred Billy '18 (grad transfer from West Florida to North Greenville) have found new homes. SHE'S THE G.O.A.T.

Graduated senior Jamie Springstead rewrote the SSES basketball record book during her time on campus, finishing with 1,605 career points to become the school's all-time leading scorer – regardless of gender. In a Jan. 6 home victory against Patel High, Springstead eclipsed the career scoring mark set by 1981 graduate Mack Barnes (1,361 points). She established the new record for girls' basketball as a junior, surpassing 2001 graduate Amy Pullen's 1,027 points.

Springstead, who will play basketball at Lake Forest College in Illinois, broke into the Falcons' varsity roster as a seventh grader. She averaged 6.1 points per game that season and 4.3 the next before becoming a starter and key performer (9 points, 5.5 rebounds per game) for SSES as a freshman. Over the past three seasons, Springstead has averaged nearly 17 points per outing and scored a career-high 32 points on Jan. 20 against Venice High.

More importantly, she led the turnaround of a program that failed to post a winning record or reach any kind of postseason play from 1999 to 2017. Since Springstead's seventh grade season in 2016-17, the Falcons have gone a combined 92-48 with five consecutive winning seasons. The 2019-20 team reached the state Final Four and produced the best record in school history at 26-5.
