



Twin brothers Sydney and Chase Brown are a step closer to their childhood dream of playing pro football. The 2018 Saint Stephen's graduates were selected in the NFL Draft, held April 27-29. Sydney, a safety, was chosen in the third round, 66th overall, by the Philadelphia Eagles. Chase, a running back, was the Cincinnati Bengals' fifth-round selection, 163rd overall. The Browns became just the sixth set of twins ever chosen in the same draft. Natives of Canada, Chase and Sydney put together star-studded careers at the University of Illinois. They were members of back-to-back state championship teams at SSES in 2016 and 2017.

* From the Head of School's desk . . .

The year was 1988 and it was my first time stepping onto the Saint Stephen's campus. Enrollment was 222 in grades K-12 and I was hired to be the Lower School Director and given the challenge to help grow an Upper School. Fast forward to 2023. Enrollment is 740 in grades PK3-12 and I now have been at Saint Stephen's for 35 years, the last 20 as Head of School. For me, those years have gone by in a flash!

I arrived in 1988 to work in trailers that seemed to be held together by duct tape. There were only a couple permanent buildings on campus. The one constant since those early days

is that there have always been outstanding faculty, staff and administration who give so much of themselves each and every day. There has also always been a challenging academic curriculum that prepares students for college and a nurturing environment that allows every child to be known and valued.

As a person who likes a challenge, enjoys working collaboratively with motivated, intelligent people and always has a new idea, Saint Stephen's has been the perfect place for me to build my career. Over the past 35 years, with the help of many dedicated Board members, supportive parents, an amazing administration, faculty and staff, and thousands of curious and intelligent students, Saint Stephen's Episcopal School has grown into an



internationally known college preparatory school. We continue to add new academic programs, offer a plethora of extra-curricular activities each year and hold our own on the athletic fields. Our teams and individuals win district and regional competitions and, this year, individuals and/or teams qualified and headed off to state competition nearly a dozen times! And the school continues to want to grow and change to be even better!

I am so proud to have been part of this story. Not many people get the opportunity to be a part of something where you can see dreams come true, and has such an impact on the lives of so many. But I have, and I am very thankful.

People have asked me, "why retire now," and I simply say, "it is just time." I have loved every minute of what has been a special "calling" in my life. I feel confident that I have left what I found in a better place and I've been inspired by everyone whose path I have crossed. With the help of many, I'm leaving the school in a healthy financial position, with a new Strategic Plan, a new Master Site Plan that includes 13 new projects, a dedicated Board of Trustees, outstanding administrators, teachers and staff, supportive parents, strong enrollment, challenging and developmentally appropriate academic programs, a growing fine arts department and successful athletic teams. In addition, every project on the Master Site Plan that I was given in 2003, except one, has been completed. That last project, the S.T.E.A.M. Center, has raised \$8.6-million as of May 22, with more funding coming in each day, thanks to the wonderful support of our school community. We are excited about the upcoming groundbreaking on Oct. 3, 2023.

I am also so pleased to have Mr. Peter Kraft come in on July 1 to begin his career at Saint Stephen's. He has an impressive resume in the independent school world and is a strong leader who is excited to become the new Head of School. I've enjoyed talking with him weekly for the past year and having him on campus for five different visits. I know he now feels very "Saint Stephenized" and is ready to join the community.

Thank you for all the kind words and beautiful ways you have said goodbye to me over the past few months. I will always care and be helpful to Saint Stephen's where I can and you will see me just being "Nani" to Annabelle, Piper and a soon-to-be Fledgling, our youngest grandchild, Betty. Saint Stephen's will always be a part of my life.



On Campus

JANUARY

■ A virtual tour was added to the Saint Stephen's website, allowing visitors to take a complete online walking tour of the 35-acre campus. The dynamic software has a wide variety of features, including video interfaces as you enter select spaces that allow you to meet our amazing teachers in their classrooms.



The Parents' Association drew a huge crowd by hosting its first *International Food Festival* in the Palm Courtyard. Parents with international backgrounds shared their heritage and some amazing home-cooked ethnic dishes with the campus community.

■ The first Falcon Athletic Boosters' *Family Sports Day* was a huge success. SSES varsity student-athletes ran drills and demonstrated their sports to a younger group of future stars for the Green & Gold. Raffles and food trucks added to the fun.



■ The annual "Headliners in Education" event for SSES parents was highlighted by presentations about primary and secondary education issues from current Head of School Dr. Jan Pullen and Peter Kraft, Saint Stephen's incoming leader for the 2023-24 school year.

FEBRUARY



- Bluesman Tas Cru taught Intermediate School students a little about blues music including an awesome harmonica jam with fifth grade math teacher Mr. Parseghian and a student. Cru's visit was arranged by Realize Bradenton and the Suncoast Blues Society.
- Katelynn Luke, Chloe Zhang, Jackie Rappold, Emma Rigney, and Dominic Detweiler from the Upper School Band participated in the district Solo & Ensemble Music Performance Assessment. Each student prepared a piece of music from the approved list, performed for an adjudicator, and all received a rating of "excellent" or higher.
- Saint Stephen's Latin brought home gold at the Latin Regional Competition at Plant High School in Tampa. The Falcons finished first in Academics, first in Advanced Certamen, and collected a host of individual first-place medals and ribbons.



■ Senior *Elaina Bayard* became the seventh Saint Stephen's student to win the top prize in the 11 years of Theater Odyssey's Ten-minute Student Playwriting Festival, earning her a \$1,000 scholarship. SSES students wrote three of the eight finalist plays that were performed at the Asolo's Cook Theatre. Bayard won with her work, "A Matter of Time." Junior *Patrick Van Eyck* and freshman *Sawyer Girgis* each won \$200 prizes. Students in grades 9-12 were invited to submit original plays and the finalists were chosen from among 40 entries. Saint Stephen's was the only area school to produce multiple finalists.

MARCH

- The SSES Algebra Team finished third in the region out of 20 schools at a Florida Mu Alpha Theta math honors society regional competition at Middleton High School in Tampa.
- The annual Parents' Association Spring Fling took on a new theme as the first "S.T.E.A.M. Fling," with help from community partners including Mote Marine Laboratory and the FAB Lab. In addition to the usual food and carnival games, science demonstrations took center stage.



- A group of Saint Stephen's students spent spring break at Esbjerg International School, our sister school in Denmark. The Falcons attended classes with their Danish friends who visited us back in November and experienced Denmark Easter traditions such as egg painting and tossing down a hill, secret letters, and a mud run.
- Handlers from the Southeastern Guide Dogs were on campus training some of their amazing pups to be service dogs that will eventually assist visually impaired high school students. They spent some time in and out of classrooms in the Upper School, and in the lunch area.
- *Ric Russo*, assignment desk editor at WFTS ABC Action News in Tampa, visited with Mr. Hoonhout's journalism students to answer questions and discuss his experiences in nearly 40 years as a print and broadcast journalist.



- Casts filled with Upper and Middle School actors presented six fun-filled musical performances of "Footloose" in the Falcon Playhouse during Fine Arts Week.
- Internationally known author *Carol McCloud*, who writes about "Bucket Filling" - a concept that leads to daily happiness and kindness to others, visited with students from Fledgling to sixth grade. They participated in songs, role playing, words of wisdom, and all pledged to be bucket fillers!

APRIL

- Saint Stephen's celebrated Earth Day with a special Falcon Friends gathering that was highlighted by the planting of a tree near the middle school in memory of former longtime SSES Latin teacher *Linda Mishkin*, who died in February after a long battle with cancer.
- Senior Jackson **Nealis** finished in fourth place at the U.S. History Bee nationals in Arlinaton, Vir. The Bee is a buzzer-based quiz tournament competition focused exclusively on



American history for primary and secondary school students across the U.S.

- The National High School Strength Coaches Association named Erik Schulz, SSES director of strength and conditioning, the NHSSCA's Florida Coach of the Year. Schulz is a Saint Stephen's alum, Class of 2011.
- After helping the Falcons win a district lacrosse title in the afternoon, **Bella Rosa** (Art-Photography) and Sophia Creneti (Journalism) took home Golden Herald Awards on the evening of April 13. The awards, presented by Manatee Memorial Hospital, have been given annually since 1978 to outstanding Manatee County high school seniors.




■ The iourney from homelessness to the NFL for

MAY

Cassidy Miller received a 2023 Anne Frank Humanitarian Award presented by the Florida Holocaust Museum in St. Petersburg. Established in 2001, this award honors outstanding humanitarian efforts by high school juniors in public and private schools in Pinellas, Pasco, Hillsborough, Sarasota, and Manatee counties. Schools recommend students who have made a conscious decision to better the lives of other individuals or groups both inside and outside of school activities. An outstanding student, Cassidy is also active in community theater and volunteers by reading to poor and underserved children.

"There's no way I am playing that type of music on that guitar," I said stubbornly to Señora Fogarty when she approached me with a six-string Spanish guitar.

"But we need you for the upcoming conference . . . the Tuna needs you! You can play the guitar, and besides, this music is in your roots," insisted Señora. At that time in my life, singing in Spanish was not a problem. However, I was 15 years old and going through my punk rock phase, so anything outside of my electric

guitar noise held little appeal. Back in 1988, I shaved my head, wore combat boots, and spent my weekends slam dancing at hardcore shows. Now, I was being invited to play an ancient looking guitar, dress in a medieval outfit (replete with women's tights and a cape!) and sing in Spanish. The Saint Stephen's high school group called "Tuna de San Esteban," established just one year earlier, was set to compete in the annual Florida State Spanish Conference held every spring in Orlando. The idea reeked of "un-coolness." "Let me tell you something, Pedro. There will be hundreds of girls at this conference! Girls love to be serenaded," claimed Señora confidently. Suddenly, I was interested. Señora Fogarty knew how to push the right buttons to capture my attention. After some debate over the music

and guitar playing, we sat down after school one afternoon. Señora taught me my first tuna song on the guitar: "Clavelitos." In Spain, this is the guintessential "tuna" song. Tunas, simply stated, are groups of university students in Spain desirous of travel and adventure who successfully maintain a centuries-old tradition of donning medieval dress and playing music with string instruments. This tradition has spread throughout most of Latin America, and even into other countries in Europe. I vaguely remember tunas growing up in my native Puerto Rico; they existed at the main universities on the island.

However, this was my official introduction to a world that would completely change the trajectory of my life. At first, Clavelitos seemed cheesy. It was elementary but required learning to play with my fingers rather than a guitar pick. Perhaps it was in my blood as I took to it quickly and found joy in the tradition and musicality. As "uncool" as it seemed initially, it felt natural to play the Spanish guitar. By the time spring of 1989 rolled around my six classmates and I had a solid repertoire of TWO songs and felt ready to compete. My group mates (all gringos) and I had become extremely close friends (and remain so to this day), and during the two-hour drive to Orlando the momentum was building – along

with visions of grandeur. We hoped to make Saint Stephen's proud, but who were we kidding – the promise of eager groupies was our primary motivation. Surprisingly, from the moment we stepped off the bus, many high school girls and teachers greeted us, "Are you guys going to sing again this year? Are you the Tuna guys?" Having won first place in the entertainment division the year before, a precedent had been set. As fate (and a lot of hard work) would have it, we ended up winning first place in the entertainment division for a second year in a row! What started as an invitation to join a musical group of students transformed into a passion for all things Spanish music. It was also my first understanding of intrinsic vs. extrinsic education. Señora's invitation to join the tuna stirred something inside me. I enjoyed the competitive aspect of it, but the passion

took hold and I found myself spending hours practicing my instrument after school, learning new songs, writing lyrics, and scouring my mom's old cassette tape collection looking for more music. My older sister indulged my growing interest and brought back a "bandurria" from Madrid after she spent a semester studying abroad. The bandurria is a 12-string instrument that is associated with Tunas as their main instrument. With this instrument, we upgraded the musical level and sound produced by our group. Señora's creativity, combined with her students'




passion, resulted in first place in the Spanish Conference four consecutive years. During my years in Tuna de San Esteban, a seed was planted. It motivated me to study abroad in Spain and strive to make the "major leagues" of tunas. In 1993, during my junior year of college, I realized my dream while studying in Seville. I joined the tuna affiliated with the University of Seville's school of law. Being a member of a tuna is a lifelong endeavor (like a fraternity), and in the 30 years since joining I have traveled all over the world with my Seville tuna bringing this music and tradition to countless close friends and family. My passion transferred to my mother who, while suffering from a terminal illness in 1994, asked me to take her to Spain and serenade her. She passed less than three months after that magical evening under a balcony. Members of my tuna showered her with songs and affection. Her glow, complete happiness, and twinkle in her eyes let me know that she arrived in heaven before her physical departure. My group danced with her while singing timeless songs that all of us grew up with in Puerto Rico. It was during that moment I learned the power of music, a power that transcends even a terminal illness and creates an eternal moment of happiness and connection.

As fate would have it, Señora, her two daughters Molly and Cristina, her son-in-law Louis and a plethora of grandkids met

me in Seville during spring 2014. I was there for the yearly competition with my aunt Teresa, who was terminally ill at that time. Señora and her daughters got to be judges for part of the competition and we serenaded them from under their balcony in the city. This was exactly 20 years after my mother came to Spain with me. It felt like a date with destiny; a "full circle" sort of feeling enveloped that unforgettable encounter in Spain with Señora.

Three and a half decades have passed since the day I met Señora Fogarty at Saint Stephen's. I'm grateful for her and the chords she taught me on the guitar. During the last few years, I spent a considerable amount of quality time with her as our relationship evolved from that of a teacher-student to more like a mother-son. Almost every time we visited, a guitar was available. Inevitably, I would pick it up to sing and play for her. Sometimes she would dance with her husband Gene. Other times she would sing along with me and had a big smile. Just three days before her passing, Julie (as I came to call Señora many years prior) was so tired that she slept most of that sunny afternoon. She was no longer able to speak, and she didn't appear to recognize anyone present. Then, as I sang those old and familiar songs to her surrounded by her family, she moved her head, eyes closed, to the rhythm of the music and mustered a smile one last time. Neither of us ever forgot the song she taught me 35 years ago.



After 35 years of extraordinary leadership, Dr. Jan Pullen will begin a new chapter in her life as she retires, but we've ensured that her legacy will always be celebrated at Saint Stephen's! Thanks to the many generous donors who supported our recent drive, the future S.T.E.A.M. Center at Saint Stephen's will be named in honor of Dr. Pullen. Her portrait, commissioned by the Board of Trustees and Parents'

Association, will hang in the facility, celebrating the impact she had in growing SSES into one of the top college preparatory schools in Florida and the nation.



A Letter From Peter Kraft:

Dear Saint Stephen's Community,

When I was appointed Saint Stephen's incoming Head of School in April 2022, I received a number of extraordinary gifts. That is why, in consultation with the Board, I have asked Dr. Pullen to serve as a senior advisor to the Development

In July I will share the details of my first-year priorities. All of these priorities are grounded in three principles:

- Positioning Saint Stephen's for future success as one of the region's premier college preparatory independent schools;
- And making good on Saint Stephen's promise that "every child will be known and every child will be valued."

In short, my focus will be to honor what makes Saint Stephen's special . . . and to help us achieve even loftier goals. Soaring higher, after all, is what Falcons do.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to lead Saint Stephen's. Our family is blessed to be part of the SSES community.





Falcons Win Big On and Off the Field

Saint Stephen's consistently defies the assumption that outstanding academics and championship-level athletics can't co-exist on the same campus – and the Falcons made that point loud and clear during the 2022-23 school year.

When the Florida High School Athletic Association announced in early May its Academic Team Champions in all classifications, Saint Stephen's ranked No. 1 overall in Class 2A. Schools are classified by student population and receive points based on the cumulative grade point averages of each team they sponsor. SSES led the way, three points in front of second-place Naples St. John Neumann and 23 points ahead of third-place Vero Beach St. Edwards. In the spring alone, Saint Stephen's had six teams rank top 10 academically in the state: baseball (1), boys lacrosse (2), boys track (2), boys weightlifting (2), girls track (5) and boys tennis (9). Boys basketball (2), boys soccer (4), girls swimming (5), boys golf (7), girls basketball (9), boys cross country (9) and girls soccer (10) rounded out programs that finished among the top 10 during the campaign.

"Our student-athletes never cease to impress and amaze me," Athletic Director Lenny Paoletti said. "They not only find a way to balance competitive sports with their rigorous academic responsibilities, but they consistently excel at both – and so many play multiple sports."

In fact, the Falcons rostered 739 student-athletes during the school year despite having only 466 students eligible in grades 6-12. Those students made up 45 teams – 23 varsity, four junior varsity, 18 middle school – and competed in more than 600 games.

Success in the classroom was matched step-for-step on the fields and courts. Of the 23 varsity teams fielded, nine won district titles and four more were runners-up. Ten middle school teams competed in the Manasota Middle School Athletic Conference, and seven won championships – boys cross country, girls cross country, flag football, boys basketball, girls basketball, tennis, and golf.

The year was filled with highlights and school firsts. In the fall, boys' golf made its third consecutive state tournament appearance and finished eighth overall. Football rebounded from a slow start to win its final five games, including a convincing 47-7 victory over Legacy Charter in the Sunshine State Athletic Conference 5A championship game in Lakeland.

Boys' basketball (21-8) was the surprise of the winter season, winning just the second district title in school history and recording the program's first-ever regional tournament win by topping Admiral Farragut in the guarterfinals. SSES also fielded competitive weightlifting teams for the first time and the girls won the district championship in their inaugural season, qualifying lifters for the regional and state tournaments. And eighth grader Jag Shepard became the first Saint Stephen's wrestler to advance to the state meet since 2019.

The spring season brought another historic campaign when girls' lacrosse ran off 17 consecutive wins to open the season and advanced to the state's Final Four for the first time. Senior Bella Rosa was one of 12 female studentathletes named to the Florida Dairy Farmers Academic All-State Team. The boys' tennis doubles team of Max Pettingell and Ricardo Perazzolo won their way to a berth in the state finals before falling just short, and the track and field team qualified 12 student-athletes for the state meet in Jacksonville. That equaled the school record set in 2017 for the highest number of qualifiers from SSES. Freshman Keymani Dillingham then made SSES history by registering top-five finishes in three events: shot put (2nd), 400-meter hurdles (4th) and 100-meter hurdles (5th). She was joined in the top 10 by discus thrower Caleb Johnson (6th), long jumper Braden Mohr (8th) and javelin thrower Evan Brown (9th).

Delia Revard '14 was


